members assist with charity and fundraising opportunities. Such a focus on community involvement means that Mandan High School's students had a major impact on the local businesses, many of whom are more than happy to both receive assistance and support their future endeavors.

"Everyone in Mandan is always willing to help," said Brown. "Business owners are happy to lend their time, whether it's through donations, listening in to our presentations, or serving on our advisory committee. We have a great relationship."

"I think people love to see how involved we are with our school and FBLA," said Wilkens, "and how we're putting effort into something for our future. They really appreciate that in students."

This, of course, isn't to say that citizens are the only ones who benefit from the arrangement. According to the students, the opportunity to get involved in every facet of the community around them (and

likewise, the elective as a whole) has allowed them to learn more about both business and personal development to a stunning degree.

"Networking is definitely a major thing," said Wilkens. "We go to different conferences and events, where you meet so many different people from everywhere. You learn a lot of new names and faces that are good to know in the community, and it helps point you on the right path after high school."

"In addition to meeting people," said Forde, "I think that FLBA teaches you a lot that you can use in the future. Taking an accounting test or working in a group with your friends can help prepare you for what those sorts of things look like in a professional setting.'

Those in charge of the group, meanwhile, have taken pride in seeing just how much its members grow over time, and Brown notes that students who enter tend to leave with newfound confidence and abilities that far surpass what they originally thought

was possible.

"Seeing them come in as wide-eyed freshmen and out as skilled young professionals is wonderful," said Brown. "Comparing their first presentations to their recent work, they're miles apart. I think they're also much better at stepping up and taking leadership roles, and much more willing to go out and help in the community. When we need to start reaching out to businesses, they're the ones who understand what's going on."

While their time with the school may end in the next few years, Mandan High's FBLA members still have plenty of opportunities to continue their involvement, as many colleges also operate their own branches. Even beyond their time in education, the organization's alumni and volunteer programs ensure that former members can still have a hand in guiding the next generationand according to those currently in the program, the things they gain from this experience will last a lifetime either way.

"I used to be very introverted when I first went to high school," said Wilkens, "but I'm a lot more social now, and a lot of that came from interacting with people through the FBLA. It helps you open up to the world, and be prepared to do anything.

"It opens your perspective on the world," said Miller. "Meeting and helping people from not just Mandan or North Dakota but around the country really shows you how many people see the importance of these skills, and gives you a drive to keep learning them."
