Both the Senate and the House still have 44 bills yet to be heard. There are also 47 Conference Committees that have been appointed to resolve the differences from what each chamber changed in a particular bill. Sometimes one meeting gets it done, other bills require numerous meetings.

As Appropriations continue to find some budget solutions, they have gone a bit backwards and we are currently \$232 million under water. It seems that there are some here who still believe that there is an infinite amount of money. There will be some difficult decisions coming soon to get us to a

April is also a time to remind people that North Dakota has a law that allows parents to turn to approved Baby Safe Haven sites if they are unable to safely care for their baby. Parents can safely surrender a baby up to one year of age without fear of prosecution or questions. Babies must be unharmed and given to an onduty staff member at a hospital or other approved location.
