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Hankinson's 'Gumball Machine' bubbles up over \$2,000 for Cares for Cancer

In a heartwarming initiative that has spanned nearly a decade, Hankinson Elementary School sixth-grade teacher Eric Grohnke has turned a simple gumball machine into a powerful fundraising tool that benefits Cares for Cancer.

The machine, located in the teacher's sixth grade classroom, has raised more than \$15,000 since 2014. This year, the campaign set a new record, collecting \$2,039.84.

The idea for the machine came after Grohnke's mother passed away from cancer in 2009. Wanting to honor her memory, Grohnke decided to donate the gumball proceeds to Cares for Cancer, an organization that helps cancer patients and families who need help with bills or travel to appointments.

Cares for Cancer is more than just cancer patients. There is funding available to any individual currently battling any medical illness or condition and their families, if they qualify for granting.

Every year, sixth grade students enthusiastically buy gumballs, with many students purchasing them before and after school. The machine also features special prize gumballs, offering rewards such as candy bars, homework passes, and even football cards.

The excitement doesn't stop with the younger students, many high schoolers also join in, purchasing gumballs after school.

One of the most exciting events each year is "Gumball Day," held in March.

That year, the fundraiser raised \$2,010, setting the previous record for total donations until this year's impressive \$2,039.84.

Both appeared to have died from gunshot wounds, according to officials with the Richland County Sheriff's Department. Krause and Karst had lived together for many years though not married, but apparently were separated when the shooting happened.

15 YEARS AGO — March 30, 2010

A day after he rescued a Minnesota hunter from freezing to death, Hankinson's Whitey Bommersbach had a little perspective on his experience. Bommersbach was driving to work when he saw a dim light in the field, and decided to investigate. He came across a hunter wandering through the cattails with water filling his waders. He brought the hunter to his waiting pickup and found the man's eyes and mouth were frozen shut. Emergency rescuers brought the cold hunter to Oakes Community Hospital
