


DAKOTA RUSH HOUR

Carpio City Council Meeting Minutes October 7, 2024 Carpio City Hall

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Burkett at 6:30pm. Council members present were Mayor Austin Burkett, Peter Thorp, Kelvin Faul, Megan Wentworth and Dawson Huber. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Councilman Faul moved that the minutes of the last meeting be approved as submitted. Councilwoman Huber seconded the motion. Carried by all.

Visitors Present: Michael Gorder from Moore Engineering, Wayne & Linda Laumb, Bruce Nelson & a couple from Calgary passing through on their way home.

Maintenance Report:

Dump grounds: Closed for the duration of construction on the sewer project.

Unfinished Business:

Sewer project update by Michael Gorder. Ground broken on the project today. Mayor Burkett has marked all the manhole covers throughout the city as the main lines are to be upgraded with a PVC liner and some work is going to be done on the manholes and rings to bring them to grade. Councilman Thorp moved that we pay the current invoice from Moore Engineering and send in the ARPA request to cover it. Second by Councilman Faul. Carried by all.

Wayne Laumb presented a Petition for Exclusion for the portion of his property that lay within the city limits. As per instruction by council, Councilman Faul moved to accept the petition. Second by Councilman Thorp. Carried by all.

The shed on Mary Kaas property has been removed.

The camera project at the park is moving forward. Internet has been run as well as other infrastructure. Camera's to be installed this month.

Mayor Burkett removed himself from the meeting so the council could make a final decision on the sale of the property on the corner of Main and Washington Ave N. No other interested parties came forward during the month. Councilman Thorp moved that we sell the property to Ag Express for the sum of \$500. Second by Councilman Huber. Carried by all. Mayor Burkett resumed his position as Mayor.

New Business:

There is some concern over the safety of the old bank building at 424 Main St. Councilman Thorp will look into having the building inspected and discuss how to move forward at the next meeting.

Bruce Nelson wants to put a 2009 manufactured home on the property on the corner of Garfield & 2nd St E. Pictures of the structure were presented. Councilman Thorp moved to allow for the age of the home. Second by Councilman Huber. Carried by all. His contact information was given to our building inspector to reach out to him to begin the permit process. Bryce's Mobile Service is under contract to place the home.

Discussion was held regarding compensation for our building inspector. A \$100 inspection fee was discussed. This would be in addition to the normal building permit fee. A final decision will be made at the November meeting.

A state of emergency was declared due to last Saturday's windstorm. There was some additional damage to our signage. If funds become available as a result of the declaration, the City will look into getting them replaced.

City Auditor expressed a desire to transfer some funds from the sales tax account to the primary checking or the City as a cushion. Councilman Huber moved to transfer \$20,000 to the primary checking account. Second by Councilman Faul. Carried by all.

August regular meeting minutes are reviewed. Motion to approve August regular meeting minutes by Troy, 2nd by Tracy. All in favor. Motion carried.

Birdsall Grain & Seed, LLC building permit is reviewed and discussed. Motion to approve Bird-sall Grain & Seed, LLC building permit by Cindy, 2nd by Troy. All in favor. Motion carried. and possibly teaching a class. He led the Homecoming parade. Discussion is held on what to do with some of the impounded cars. One of them belongs to the Fire Department and will be removed.

Rich Blahut, Public Works Director, gave updates. A second appliance dumpster will be coming. There was a test of the new siren system and everything went well. There will be excavating at the SRT lot on September 10th due to a crushed pipe. Lift station #2 has more water coming from the NE.

The Berthold Park District 2025 Budget is reviewed and discussed. Motion to approve the Berthold Park District 2025 Budget by Troy, 2nd by Cindy. All in favor. Motion carried.

The Wild Rose Cemetery has a low interest baring CD. Motion to withdraw the lesser interest CD and re-do at the higher rate by Cindy, 2nd by Troy. All in favor. Motion carried.

June and July end of the month financial reports are reviewed. Motion to approve P&Ls by Tracy, 2nd by Troy. All in favor. Motion carried.

Bills are reviewed. Motion to approve bills by Troy, 2nd by Cindy. All in favor. Motion carried.

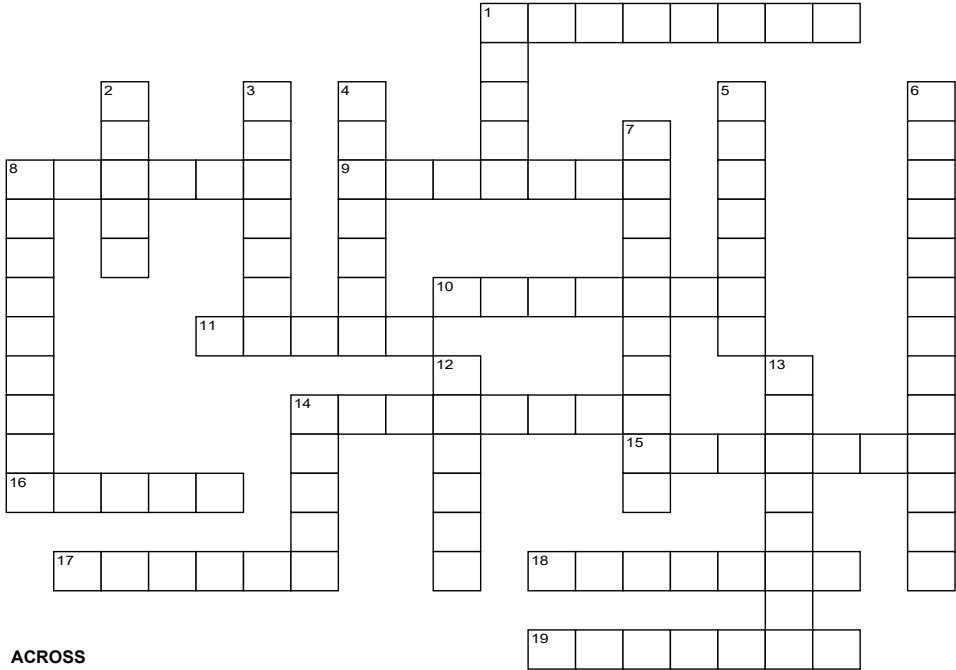
