Kenmare City Council approves Fund Itt grants

By Terry Froseth Kenmare City Council gave its approval to four grants from the Fund Itt city sales tax committee.

1. Kenmare Association of Commerce was approved for a promobe used towards expenses of over \$30,000 for city and business promotions throughout the year.

Events include the Easter Egg Hunt, City Wide Rummage Sale, Classic Car Show, Party in the Park with appreciation picnic, music, street dance and 4th of July fireworks, Turkey Bingo, Halloween Trail of Treats, Haunted Trail Walk, Light Up Night, Holiday Train.

The Association will also help promote the Women in Military Service statue dedication on Memorial Day at the Pioneer Village, and the City Serve Days on June 2-7 which encourages residents to volunteer for charitable projects throughout the community.

2. Kenmare Country Club was approved for a grant of \$25,000 to be used towards a \$408,600 project to replace and automate the entire irrigation system of the greens and fairways of the golf course.

The current system has been in the ground since the 1970s and 1980s, and is continually breaking down, and leaking. Grants from 12 different sources are pending to cover the entire cost of the

3. M&K's Pizza Hub was approved for a business improvement town, Berthold Senior Citizen matching grant of up to \$2000 towards improvements of their store tion/tourism grant of \$15,000 to front. Cost of the improvements are estimated to be \$3670.

> 4. Kenmare Theatre was approved for a business retention grant of \$10,000 towards continued operation of the movie theater. The theater operates at break-even financially, but provides a great entertainment amenity for the community that is not available in most towns the size of Kenmare. Over the years, Kenmare Theatre has provided the first job opportunity for many dozens of local teenagers.

4th Grade Field Trip to

Knife River Village in Stanton, ND ... Mrs. Feldman's Fourth Grade Class from Kenmare Elementary School went on their class field trip on May 9th, 2025. Everyone loaded the bus, driven by DuWayne Gilseth, with great excitement! The class went on an adventure for the entire day and on into the evening!

The first place the 4th Graders visited was the NDGF Fish Hatchery in Riverdale, located on the Garrison Dam. While the 4th Graders were there, they learned about what kinds of fish the fish hatchery stocks and places into the rivers in ND. They also learned about the stages of growth the fish grow through and how the hatchery helps with the reproduction of the fish to send to other hatcheries in other states. The kids had the opportunity to hold a river sturgeon and also to hold and play with some small painted turtles. The turtle's names were Sprinkles, Whipped Cream, and Pancake. The kids also walked along a mile long path to see the fish ponds where the young fish are kept until they are released into the river.

Next, the bus took the kids to the Lewis and Clark Interpretive Center and Fort Mandan in Washburn, North Dakota. The first thing the kids did was to explore Fort Mandan. While the 4th Graders were there they learned about the fort that Lewis and Clark and their crew built and stayed in during the winter of 1804. Each of the kids had the chance to go into some of the rooms and find clues to discover who might have lived in each room. Next the kids learned about some of the Native American games that were played to help pass the time during the long winter months. Each of the kids had the opportunity to play: Hoop and Stick, Double Ball, and Ice Gliders. They had a wonderful time!

We stopped to take a quick photo with Seaman, the dog that went on the expedition. Then the bus took us to the Interpretive Center to learn some more about the Lewis and Clark Expedition.

The next destination on the trip was to travel to the Knife River Indian Village in Stanton, North Dakota. While the 4th Graders were there they watched a video about Maxidiwiac, one of the last women to live in the village. She discussed the roles of the men, women, and children in the village to help everyone to survive and to get along with each other. The children explored the Interpretive Center and saw a lot of the information and items they had learned about in North Dakota Studies in class. The kids then went out into an earthlodge. While in the earthlodge, the kids saw what it would have looked like back during that time with all of the items inside to make it a home. The kids did a great job asking and answering guestions!

Finally the 4th Grade headed to the last destination on their field trip. The kids were off to the Falkirk Mines. Here the 4th Graders had a once in a lifetime chance to learn about coal production in North Dakota and to ride in one of the largest cranes in the world that excavates Lignite Coal. They toured the buildings and stood up next to one of the trucks used to haul up to 220 tons of coal each trip! The trucks were just as tall as the school building! The kids had a blast learning about the process of mining and to see all of the equipment used to help mine coal which is used to produce electricity. Each student came home with 5-6 pieces of Lignite Coal and were also given a science experiment to try! Carter Bruner's uncle, Travis Martin, along with one of his colleagues took us on the tour. It was a fabulous tour and the kids raved about the experience!


