"With Joe Gushwa's training and experience I feel real comfortable promoting him to [sergeant]," said Johnson. "There's been no issues with him whatsoever, he's been more than helpful with everything I've needed from him ... he's just been a really good deputy."

The motion to promote Gushwa was carried unanimously. However, commissioners weren't able to offer as large of a pay raise due to recent legislation signed into law that puts a 3% cap on property tax increases for at least the next two years.

The bill aims to minimize tax increases for property owners, but puts financial pressure on political subdivisions, especially rural counties.

"We're pretty frustrated ... that some of the things that went into the 3% cap left out small counties that do not have new growth, don't have options for sales tax and that kind of thing," said commissioner David Utke.

"We're concerned about where this is going to come from, and we value our employees and want to compensate them fairly, but we feel like our hands are tied," he added.

"It is what it is," Sheriff Johnson responded.

The 3% cap on property tax increases was also cited when a brief discussion was had about whether the county can afford to build a new Grace City shop rather
