Discussion was held on board appointments for Planning & Zoning, Weed Board and Park Board. At the time of the meeting there were 3 applications for Planning & Zoning, 1 application for Weed Board and 0 applications for Park

Discussion was held on the request for Board member pay. Lee Husfloen discussed that the rates should remain the same until budget discussions for

Jaden Schmidt discussed estimates from SRF Consulting for updates to the Planning & Zoning Ordinance and the Comprehensive Plan. The Commission requested Schmidt check if there are other firms that do this type of work and report back.

Discussion was held on Keith Vitek taking over the snow and ice removal for the county courthouse. Dave Berger moved and Rob Schmidt seconded the motion to hire Keith to do the outside work for the courthouse in the summer and winter at an hourly rate of 27.50. Dave Berger rescinded the motion and stated he would discuss with Keith Vitek about the hourly rate.

Discussion was held on having the Courthouse closed on January 9th, due to President Carter's funeral. No action was taken and the Courthouse will remain opened on January 9th.

Kyle Miller, Road Superintendent, discussed road issues. Gravel concerns were addressed.

Kyle Miller, Road Superintendent, has stepped down as road superintendent, but would like to remain as a blade operator, effective January 9th.

Discussion was held on advertising for the position on the website, Job Service and Facebook. Alice Grinsteinner will take care of that.

Lee Husfloen thanked Kyle for his time as road superintendent.

Discussion was held on the State Road Department building and land. When the state offers their lot for sale, the county could consider purchasing.

Discussion was held on County Vehicle

Decals and Magnets. Dave Berger moved and Rob Schmidt seconded the motion to approve the purchase of decals and magnets through signs. com. All in favor, none opposed; motion carried.

Traveling chess educator Tom Wolf has been inspiring youths to learn the game of chess since 2021. A former secondary education teacher, Wolf has established a full-time job of traveling throughout North Dakota to hold chess enrichment courses. ""I ask myself, sometimes, why I do this, why do I drive all around North Dakota and do this, especially in the winter," Wolf said. "But then I get there and suddenly I get an adrenaline rush with how excited the kids are."

school finally booked him for a session and Sinclair was pleasantly surprised with not only how well his students responded to Wolf's teachings, but picking up tidbits of information on chess himself.

"I knew how to play chess before, but when I watched his sessions, I found myself learning a few things I didn't know," Sinclair laughed. "He presents it in a way where kids can pick it up?

Sinclair said his own children learned to play chess and enjoy playing each other after school. Though there may only be a handful of students that pick up the game after participating in Wolf's sessions, Sinclair said it was well worth having him come in and giving kids an new opportunity for enjoyment.

"We have recesses where kids will play, which is something for them to do, especially when it's 20-below outside," Sinclair said.

In an age where young children and young adults spend endless hours on their hand-held electronic devices, there are a few students at Beulah Public Schools who have taken up the interest of the classic board game, which is a refreshing delight for parents and teachers alike, said Beulah Middle School Principal Stacy Munson.

"It's really cool that we have kids interested in chess," said Munson, who has welcomed Wolf to her fifth- and sixth-grade classrooms to teach the students chess the last few years. "It's so nice to see some kids still have interests in something that is more than just video games or their cellphones. Sadly, with the majority of kids these days, these electronic devices dominate their lives. So it's refreshing to see these kids more interested in board

Chess is a popular game that has been shown to improve memory function, which, in general, psychologists point to chess being a highly effective way to advance one's intelligence.

"It helps with their strategical thinking and it's a promising improvement of their intelligence for the future for those kids interested in playing chess," Munson

She said the number of students interested in Wolf's chess enrichment program fluctuates from year to year at Beulah Public Schools, however, without Wolf's influence, Beulah students may never get an opportunity to learn the classic board game.

Since Wolf has arrived, interest has grown and though the school district cannot afford to create a chess club due to a lack of available faculty, the school does provide supervised sessions in the high school library on Wednesdays after classes.

Though he usually only visits a particular town or

school once a year - which he plans to visit Center-Stanton Public Schools in March for the reading month, for example - Wolf said he is working on finding a way to share his traveling schedule for all students interested in wanting to join him in other chess programs that may be nearby them.

In the meantime, Wolf has encouraged his young chess enthusiasts to hone their skills and enjoy the game of chess online, at Chess.com.

"You don't even have to create an account or log on," he said. "And you can play against a 'bot.' One of the nice things about playing online is the computer won't let you make an illegal move so you can learn from it."
