He will reach out to owner with a time line and if no action is taken by owner, he will gets bids for abatement and it will be assessed to owner's taxes. Mr. Kaffer updated the council on residents with no water service. He has been in contact with Western Plains Health, they will enforce, with the authority of NDCC 23-35-09.

Sheriff's office receives grant for critical equipment upgrade

Thanks to a program through Farm Credit Services, the Mercer County Sheriff's Office will be able to get upgraded equipment for its officers.

The Farm Credit Services Rural Community Grant Fund comes through AgriBank, which is based out of St. Paul, Minn. The Rural Community Grant Fund provides financial support for community needs in western North Dakota impacted by mineral development in the Bakken region, partnering with AgCountry Farm Credit Services and the Farm Credit Service of Mandan in providing the program. AgriBank is the wholesale money supplier for Farm Credit Services of Mandan, which has a branch in Beulah.

This year, Farm Credit Services provided a check for \$34,058 to the Mercer County

Sheriff's Office for emergency response equipment through this program.

"We got the grant for special response team upgraded critical equipment," Deputy Chris Waller said. "It will help protect our officers. Hopefully we never have to use it, but it's there if it's needed."

"Really, this gives our officers a better chance of coming home at the end of the day," Sheriff Terry Ternes said, adding that the equipment is also for other local law enforcement agencies, including the police departments in Beulah and Hazen.

"The program is a way for Farm Credit Services to support our community needs and the people who keep us safe," Steve Finsaas, loan officer and office manager with Farm Credit Services of Mandan, said.

Finsaas presented the check to the Mercer County Sheriff's Office on Friday afternoon at the lending institution's Beulah location.
