where they had left my walker. I decided I was going to give Emery and the other girls a little reward for their kindness. I had quarters on my table at home, ready to be wrapped and decided to drive home and put some in plastic bags and give it to them.

Their mother came out of the church before I had driven off, and I told her the story. She said I did not need to pay them, but I told her I did it because I wanted to.

What totally touched my soul was that someone of Emery's age would reach out to me in such a sweet, kind way. My first thought was what terrific parenting that youngster must have, what a delight she must be to her teacher, and what a role model must she be to her friends.
