LaMoure County Commission

The LaMoure County Commissioners met on Tuesday morning for their second meeting of the month with all the members present.

Road Superintendent Nitschke asked how the commissioners want to handle the planting of trees. He asked if the trees can be planted where the old trees were even though they are in violation of the current rules. The rules that they have in place for tree plantings are not enforceable but are suggested rules. The county would like to have the trees planted two hundred feet back from the middle of the road. The road restrictions have been lifted county wide. The dust control and soil stabilization process will begin next week on CR 34.

Brian from KLJ gave a guick update on the projects being done this summer. Nothing will be going on probably until after July 1st. He gave a quick synopsis on what funding will be coming from the state the next two years. There will be less money in the Prairie Dog fund than previously. Other funds have increased to cover the loss but they have not ironed out the details. Townships have had their funds increased. If any township has questions, they can contact KLJ. Darrick wanted to remind the townships to get better estimates before they submit their applications. The township estimates have been lower than the actual cost of a project.

Emergency Manager Kimberly Robbins explained what the fire ratings have been since the last commission meeting. The county's burn restriction will expire at the end of May. She then gave a report on the river gauge at Adrian. The contract has to be April 25, 2025- In a grand celebration marking a century of community service, the renewed every year. This year there will be a two percent increase in cost. She will present it to the City of LaMoure as they cost share for the gauge. The county will wait for the actual cost before making a decision.

The commissioners discussed getting an outside attorney to help with a memorandum opinion on zoning and do a comprehensive plan. The attorney will be able to guide the county through what they are able to control and what is out of their authority. Mr. Wald said all the county needs is a zoning board to halt construction on anything. The county will get an opinion before making any decisions on the subject. The commissioners have not formally endorsed nor have they made a decision against the utility projects in the county. They have up to this point left them decisions to the townships. Mr. Flath asked what the cost for the lawyer will be. They do not have an estimate. They went with what they decided at the last meeting and ask an outside attorney the one question.

A gaming permit was approved for the Horseshoe Saloon for their gaming site. The gaming entity is Progress Enterprises out of Jamestown. The commissioners again suggested any gaming in the county should benefit county non-profits.

FREE Babysitting Clinic Offered by NDSU **Extension – LaMoure County**

LaMoure, ND - NDSU Extension - LaMoure County will host a FREE Babysitting Clinic on Tuesday, May 27 from 9am - 4pm at the Emergency Response Center in LaMoure. This one-day event is open to youth turning 12 years old in 2025, with limited spots available-only 12 participants will be accepted. Early registration is encouraged by calling the LaMoure County Extension Office at 701-883-6080.

Led by NDSU Extension Agent Danielle Dinger, the clinic will cover essential topics to prepare young babysitters, including:

The Business of Babysitting, Child Development, Basic First Aid, Food and Nutrition Safety, Entertainment

With safety being a top priority, guest speakers from the LaMoure Ambulance Service, LaMoure Fire Department, and LaMoure Police Department will provide expert guidance and answer questions related to child safety in and around the community.

A parent panel is also being planned to give participants real-life insights into babysitting from a parent's perspective. Parents interested in sharing their experiences are encouraged to reach out to Danielle Dinger at the Extension Office. Parents are also welcome to bring young children to assist with hands-on learning and to help potential babysitters gain real-world experience.

At the conclusion of the clinic, participants will be tested on what they've learned, and certificates of completion will be awarded.

This clinic is designed to:

Familiarize youth with babysitting responsibilities

Provide critical knowledge for responsible babysitting

Teach necessary safety and caregiving skills

Build confidence in handling babysitting situations

Encourage a positive attitude toward child care

Youth who are 11 years old may register, but priority will be given to those who are 12. Don't miss this fun, skill-building opportunity to prepare the next generation of safe, confident babysitters!
