Napoleon City Council

City Council Monthly Meeting Monday April 7th, 2025 Napoleon City Hall 7:30 p.m. (Subject to council review and approval)

Mayor Moos called the regular meeting to order. Alderman present: Rod Kleppe, Mike Heying, Clark Haas, Bob Humann, John Wald, and Rich Bjerklie.

Pledge of Allegiance was recited by all.

Wald motioned to approve the minutes from March 3rd, 2025, meeting, Heying seconded, motion carried. Humann motioned to approve the minutes of the special meeting on March 18th, 2025, Kleppe seconded, motion carried.

Bjerklie motioned to approve the financial report, Wald seconded, motion carried.

Grant Dockter from Moore Engineering presented the Engineer's Report. Dockter reported the 2021 Water Systems Improvements project, Sanitary Sewer Improvements project and the 2023 Water Systems Improvements are completed except for the special assessments that need to be finalized for the 2023 project, which will not be certified but the process has to be completed since government funding was received for the project. The Pedestrian Trail project has some punch list items and seeding remaining. For the 4th St. Water Main Extension project DWR grant for preconstruction funding is secure. Eight bids were received for the project with one bid under review, for handing in the wrong paperwork. Dockter explained what the council would have to do in order to consider the rejected bid or they can make a motion to reject the bid received by Swanberg Construction. Wald motioned to reject the bid from Swanberg Construction, Bjerklie seconded, Kleppe abstained, motion carried. Dockter said the low bid was received from Cofell's Plumbing and Excavating out of Bismarck and a motion would be needed to award the bid to them. Wald motioned to award the bid for the 4th St. Water Main Extension project to Cofell's Plumbing and Excavating, Humann seconded, all hands raised in favor, motion carried. Kleppe motioned to approve the construction engineering amendment, Heying seconded, all hands raised in favor, motion carried.

DUMP & LAGOON: Bjerklie said he would like to open the landfill in about two weeks, and garbage pickup would start in the alleys around that time also. It will be advertised in the paper on the specific dates of when this will take place. Bjerklie also talked about the two bids received for a new fence around the lagoon. Humann motioned to hire Wald Fencing to put up the new fence and to pay for it out of the sewer fund, Heying seconded, Kleppe voted nay, motion passed.

Humann motioned to pay all bills as presented, Kleppe seconded, motion carried. The bill from Logan County for software purchased for the TIF paperwork was discussed again. After some discussion Humann motioned to pay for the bill, Wald seconded, Kleppe voted nay, motion carried.

RECREATION & BEAUTIFICATION: Cleanup Day has been set for Saturday, May 10th. A list of approved items will be advertised in the paper, and flyers will be put up around town. The flyer will include all the details of the event. Please abide by the rules so this can continue to be a yearly event.

CITY SALES TAX REQUESTS: White Maid is requesting a working capital loan for \$25,000. The loan will come out of the Economic Development Fund and will be at 5% interest and paid back in two payments, one in 2025 and 2026. Humann motioned to approve the request, Kleppe seconded, all hands raised in favor, motion carried.

ZONING PERMITS: Brian Jangula-replace siding on house to match garage and shop; Anton Braun-remove grain bin; Shawn

Kuipers-temporary greenhouse; Bryce Fettig-house addition; Michael Buelna-replace 4 windows, add deck, and patio door; Mike Heying-plant tree rows, build house, shed, shop and grain bin firepit; Steve Moser-install Bay window; Derrick Leier-remove old fence, remodel kitchen, add patio door; Michael Buelna-garden shed. Kleppe motioned to approve all building permits, Bjerklie seconded, motion carried.

Bjerklie motioned to approve the 2024 end of year financial report, Kleppe seconded, all hands raised in favor, motion carried.

City Hall will be closed on Friday April 18th, for Good Friday. Meeting adjourned.
