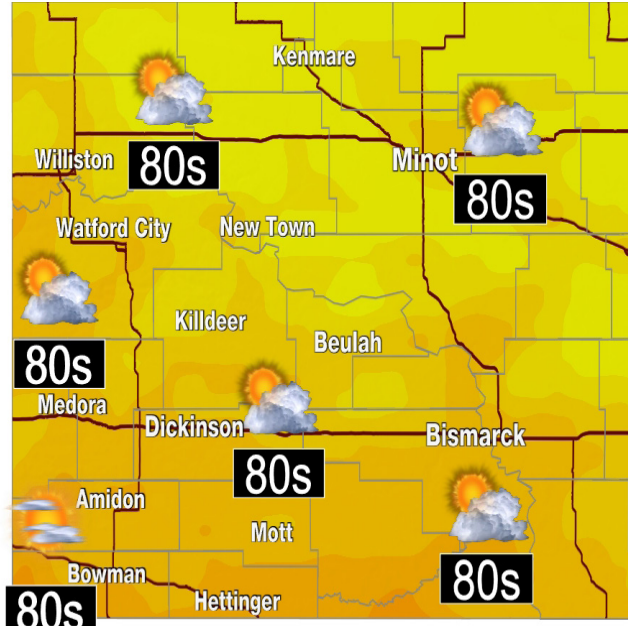



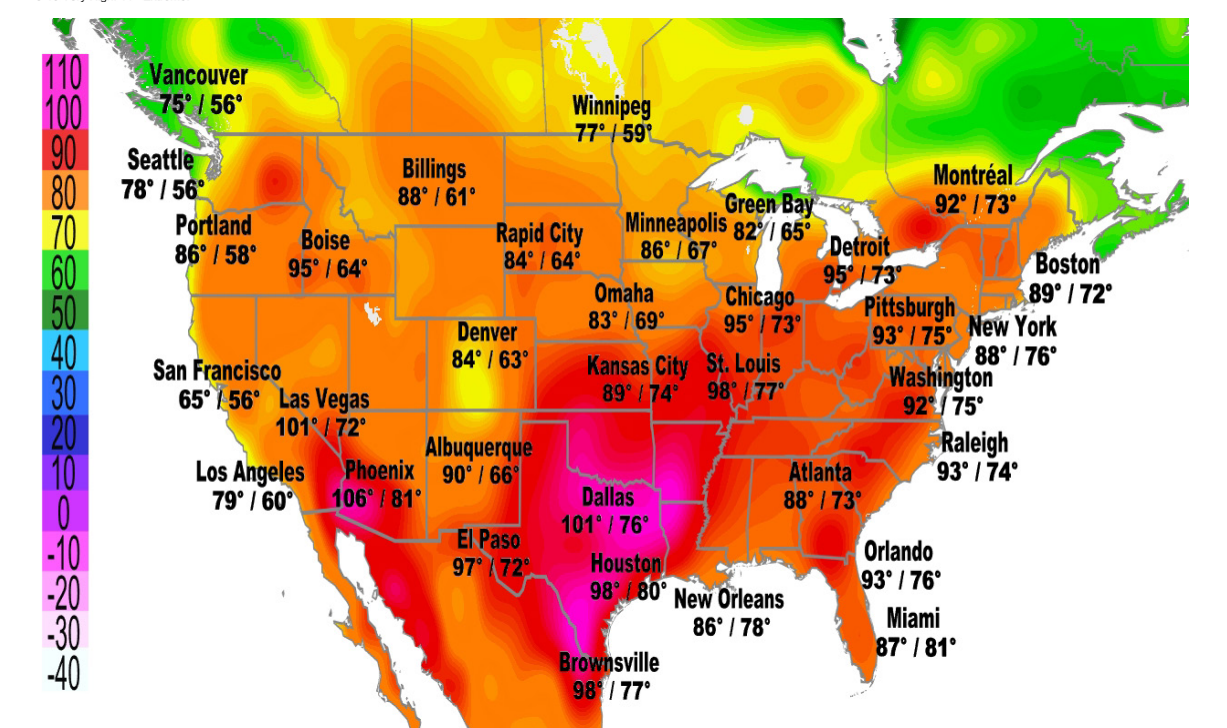

Watford City launches branding effort

The city is working with a Bismarck-based agency to create a new logo and identity, starting with a public survey open through Aug. 8

WATFORD CITY, N.D. — Watford City has launched a new city branding project aimed at developing a cohesive identity that reflects the community's growth and character.

The city has partnered with The Good Kids, a brand agency based in Bismarck, to lead the effort. The firm has previously worked on branding for North Dakota Tourism, The Merc at Long X and the Living in McKenzie County magazine and podcast.

City officials say the goal is to create an official brand guide and logo that represent both city government and the broader community. The guide is intended to ensure consistency in city communications and help articulate what makes Watford City distinct as a place to live, work and visit.

A key element of the initiative is a community engagement survey now open to residents. The survey asks for input on what residents value about Watford City and their hopes for its future. City representatives say feedback will help shape the branding direction

before design work begins.

Watford City's current branding dates back more than 20 years. In that time, the city has experienced significant change, particularly from oil and gas development that drove rapid population and economic shifts.

City leaders say the new branding aims to honor the city's past while preparing for future growth.
