

West Fargo man appeals conviction for murdering wife

FARGO — A West Fargo man convicted of killing his wife is appeal ing his conviction based on the argument that the

testimony of his children via

Zoom rather than in person violated his S. Moen constitutional rights.

On Oct. 23, 2024, a Cass County District Court jury found Spencer Moen guilty of murder for beating his wife, 30-year-old Sonja Moen, then leaving her in the bathtub to die in August 2023. He was sentenced Dec.

30 to life in prison without the possibility of parole.

Spencer Moen's appellate attorney, Sam Gereszek, filed an appeal with the North Dakota Supreme Court on April 21, arguing the conviction should be overturned and a new trial held because the district court violated Spencer Moen's "Sixth Amendment right to confront witnesses," the court document said.

Documents claim Spencer Moen's rights were

violated by "allowing two minor witnesses to testify remotely via Zoom without a finding that the minor children would suffer serious emotiona distress or any other necessity for such remote testimony.

The Sixth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution and Article I § 12 of the North Dakota Constitution give the right of a criminal defendant to be confronted with the witnesses against him.

Two of the three Moen children were at home when their mother died, and they were called to testify by the prosecution during Spencer Moen's weeklong trial.

Per North Dakota Century Code, closed-circuit video testimony from a minor witness can be used if the court finds that having the child testify in front of the defendant would cause "serious emotional distress or trauma that would impact the ability of the witness to reasonably communicate."

Spencer Moen claims in his appeal that it was not established that the "live testimony would result in serious emotional trauma or without making factual findings to justify the necessity for

remote testimony."

"The court's order permitted the children to testify with the victim witness coordinator present, but did not ensure that they were free from outside influence," Gereszek said in the appeal. "No findings of necessity, trauma or compelling state interest were made on the record."

Cass County Prosecutor Renata Olafson Selzer responded to the appeal on May 21 and pointed out that the court allowed the testimony from the children via Zoom after hearing from their therapists that live testimony

would likely harm them.

Chase ruled it would be in the best interest of the children to testify remotely. During the trial, the children were asked questions by prosecutors and the defense in another room at the Cass County Courthouse. The interactions were then broadcast to the jury.

Gereszek requested that the state Supreme Court hear oral arguments on the appeal. Olafson Selzer also offered to present oral arguments. As of press time, the state Supreme Court had no additional hearings on the case scheduled.
