

Bismarck selects Jason Stugelmeyer as city's new police chief

BISMARCK — Jason Stugelmeyer has been selected as the city of Bismarck's new police chief.

The selection was publicly announced during a Tuesday evening, July 22, City Commission meeting, when City Administrator Jason Tomanek gave the

recommendation and the commissioners unanimously accepted it.

In his statement, Draovitch thanked the community for its support for law enforcement, which he said not all communities have and the BPD has worked hard to earn. He said the agency will be in good hands.
