The School Board election is June 2, 2026.

## The Sherwood City Council held their monthly meeting on Thursday, February 19th, 2026 at 6:30pm.

Council members present were: Garrett Volk, Boyd Southam, Jarrett Keith, Will Smith, and David Thompson. Others present were John Brown, Nathan A., Steve K., Karen W., Don W., and Robert J.

Last month's meeting minutes approved at March meeting. Minutes have been submitted to the RCF, and have been published.

Agenda items were finalized and Financial Report were reviewed. 2 CD's were renewed by Garrett. Yearly payment was made for the bulk water station project, next month loan payments for the water tower project and water looping project will be submitted.

Late water bill payments were discussed. There were 4 disconnects, disconnect total was \$1,071.40. 2 shut off notices are still outstanding.

City Engineer Monthly Report: Nathan discussed with the council additional information on the Lead Service Line Replacement Funding. The city does not qualify for CDBG funding. The upcoming Lead and Copper Rule Improvements (LCRI) goes into effect November 1st, 2027 and will require the replacement of all lead service lines in ten years, replacement must be completed by 2037. Required to replace 10% per year. The DWSRF would provide 66% loan forgiveness, no interest rate and a 0.5% administration fee. Is first come, first serve basis. The city would need a plan on lead line replacement, effective November 1st, 2027. The approximate cost of the facility plan is \$25,000.00-\$35,000.00. If loan is approved, this cost could potentially be put into the loan agreement/amount.

PW Monthly Report: John stated the lights in the city shop have been replaced, and show removal is going well. Karen W. met with the board to discuss possibly renting out a room/classroom at the school for use. Kristy will put together a rental agreement for the next meeting, and will be sent to Karen for her to review before the meeting. The RCSI report was reviewed. No concerns at this time from the council. Greg Greng's had submitted had a Quit Claim Deed to the city for his lots located at Block 3, Lots 3,4,5, Parcel #: 26-0001-05722-000. He would like to deed the property to the city. Additional information will be gathered, before the deed is signed by the city. Discussion was held on the city interest to acquire Guy Beckedahl's

property located in Sherwood. Guy Beckedahl is possibly interested in deeding the lots to the city.

The city Floodplain Management Ordinance was reviewed. Boyd made a motion to accept the first reading of the ordinance. Seconded by David. All board members present were in favor, none opposed, motion carried. Seconded reading will take place at the March meeting.

The title for the city public works truck was received. Kristy will get the insurance and registration of the vehicle taken care of.

Jarrett asked about grants for the kid's basketball hoops at the Sherwood Gym. Kristy will look into options for that.

Council was given a copy of the rental agreement for the Sherwood Shares Food Pantry/2nd Hand Store. This will be reviewed at the next meeting. The currently rental agreement expires the end of March 2026.

City Government is April 6th-10th. If the council would like to do anything, please let Kristy know.

City cleanup is scheduled for May 7th thru May 14th. Kristy has ordered 2 roll-off dumpsters. They will be placed in front of the school, same location as last year.

Tax Equalization meeting has been scheduled for Monday, April 13th at 6:30pm.

Election was discussed. Notice will go into the RCF. Has already been placed on the Sherwood City Facebook page.

Payment of water/utility bills were discussed. Kristy will look into Pay Pal option, and will reach out to Banyon.

Monthly bills were reviewed. David made a motion to approve the monthly bills. Seconded by Boyd. All board members present were in favor, none opposed. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 7:50 p.m.

# Dakota Datebook

Mandan Streets written by Sarah Walker

February 25, 2026 – If you look at an old-enough photograph of the main blocks of any town in North Dakota, you will notice a common thread – the roads were not paved.

On this date in 1913, Mandan residents were investigating what it would take to pave their Main Street. There was more to contemplate than might be suspected. They had to consider what type of paving should be used, the cost of the paving, the effect of the North Dakota climate, and the amount of sidewalk needed.

Due to the "rather unsatisfactory results in the colder climate," they decided not to use asphalt. However, bitulithic pavement was a possibility. It was made through a "hot mix" asphalt paving material and process, typically containing about 6 percent "bituminous cement" and graded aggregate proportioned for low air voids. This was supposed to produce a more "fluid" binder than that used for sheet asphalt. The process was patented in 1903. Moreover, reports were that Fargo had used this type, for \$1.80 per yard.

Mandan figured that it would have to pave curb to curb, rather than "narrow up" their main street, which they considered. They estimated the cost per block to be around five thousand dollars, using an estimated cost of \$2.20 per yard.

By that August, Mandan's Main Street was torn up with the now-familiar summer sight of road construction. Cement crossings were being put into all of Mandan's side streets (with each section of cement requiring four horses to pull it into place). Curbs were put wherever the majority of property owners petitioned for it, and ornamental street lighting was installed. With all the commotion going on, Oscar Olson, who just concluded his duties as sheriff, was appointed as a special policeman to, quite literally, watch the street(s).

The Bismarck Tribune and Mandan Pioneer both reported that Mandan's Main Street looked like it had been hit by a cyclone, in its preparation for the incoming pavement. However, "practically everyone" was pleased at the prospect of the paved streets, which assuredly would beautify the city. The Mandan Pioneer stated, "While we are fixing up, let's do it right."
